## **Exposing Our Need**

## Galatians 3:15-29

A n error that the Galatians evidently had made was to think the law changed God's promise to Abraham. They seemed to think that now God's promise to Abraham was received by faith *plus* obedience to the law. Paul explains why the law was never enough to meet our need for salvation, it only serves to expose that need. Only Christ can satisfy our need through faith in Him.

The Law and the Promise

Read Galatians 3:15-20

1. What example from everyday life did Paul use to illustrate the endurance of the covenant God made with Abraham? (v.15)

2. The promises were spoken to Abraham and to his seed. Who is Abraham's seed? (v. 16)

- **3.** Why doesn't the law set aside or replace the promise of the covenant with Abraham? (vv. 17-18)
- 4. What was the purpose of the law? (vv. 19-20)

## Sons No Longer Under Law

Consider the two analogies of the law given in the next passage. The first compares the law with being a prison, and the second compares it to a "tutor". This tutor was a slave who was put in charge as the guardian of the young sons. He was the supervisor whose main function was discipline. He was expected to be harsh and would use a rod to punish boys who were unruly.
